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Sealyham Terrier

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Sealys are a healthy, hearty breed, but a rare one, and patience is required in order to obtain one. The American Sealyham Terrier Club (ASTC), is the national club of Sealy owners. A Breeders list is on its webpage under "Available Sealyham Terriers".

Sealys generally weigh 20-24 pounds, are white and can have colored markings (from light tan to nearly black) anywhere on their heads. They are considered non-shedding and hypoallergenic, but do require regular coat care and grooming.

The Sealyham gets its name from the estate of Captain Edwards, developer of the breed in Wales in 1848. Originally bred to hunt badger, fox, and otter, their white color distinguished them in the field.

"Sealys" are proud, compact, sturdy little dogs, ideal companions for young and old, giving their owners endless love and devotion. They adapt well to city and country living. As very inquisitive and delightful clowns, they survey the world with supreme confidence and good humor.

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
